Academic Internship Course Structure

What is an Academic Internship?

Academic Internships are any type of internship for which a student receives course credit. The National Association of Colleges and Employers (NACE) defines internships as "as a form of experiential learning that integrates knowledge and theory learned in the classroom with practical application and skills development in a professional workplace setting (across in-person, remote, or hybrid modalities)." Academic Internships can be developed in a variety of ways and can encompass the following:

- Engage students in work at for-profit business, nonprofit organization or government entity
- May be paid or unpaid positions
- Take place on-campus, through an SPF offered position, or at an external employer/organization.
- May or may not include internship preparation/professional development coursework

Models / Structures of Academic Internship Courses

Academic internships courses can be structured in different ways to meet course goals and department/faculty/student needs. An academic internship course can include any of the following components:

- A prerequisite internship prep course
- Repeatable for credit (students can take internship class as many times as they want)
- Weekly meeting with course content
- Regular one-on-one check-ins between student and faculty
- Requirement for student to find an internship placement prior to signing up for class
- Requirement of degree or certificate program
- Any grading mode: Mandatory CR/NC (most common), Optional Grade Basis, or Mandatory Letter Grade
- Course classifications vary. Common classifications include:
 - o C38 or C78, or
 - A combination of Seminar (C5) and Tutorial (C78) sections

Course Examples

BIOL 482 - Supervised Internship - (Dr. Jianmin Zhong in AY 24-25)

Catalog Description: Students implement the theory and practice of their major by working for a public agency or private firm/organization.

Developed by Dr. Jianmin Zhong, with CCBL, to support students in the Pre-Med and Pre-PA tracks. Offered every fall, spring, & summer semester, students rotate shadowing medical professionals. Summer offering is a paid intensive internship experience that includes a weekly course and presentations on their experiences. Summer offering is paid through grant funding.

PSCI 482 - Internship - (Kelly Fortner in AY 24-25)

Catalog Description: Field observation; placement in a public or private nonprofit agency.

Counts as one of three options that political science majors can take as part of the experiential learning requirement of their major and entails a 90 hour internship with weekly class meetings focused on career readiness activities and internship check-ins. This course is capped at 10 students and students from other majors can enroll.

REC 482 - Internship in Recreation - (Genevieve Marchand in AY 24-25)

Catalog Description: Supervised experience. Apply academic understanding to a functioning recreational agency. For over 15 years, this course has incorporated professional hands-on experience with student reflection through class meetings and assignments. Required for the recreation administration major. Required prerequisite course, REC 455 Internship and Career Preparation Workshop, which supports students with finding internships and career preparation such as resume building, interview prep and e-portfolio development.
